The airline's policy is especially advantageous when it comes to **fare classes**+ 1 - (855) → (510)→ (3558) Southwest does not differentiate its tickets in terms of change fees; all fares—including the lowest "Wanna Get Away" fares—allow passengers to retain the value of a missed flight as a credit+ 1 - (855) → (510)→ (3558) This contrasts sharply with other airlines, where low-cost or non-refundable tickets may result in total loss if a flight is missed+ 1 - (855) → (510)→ (3558) However, while Southwest eliminates change fees, travelers still need to pay attention to **fare differences** if the new flight they select is priced higher than the original ticket+ 1 - (855) → (510)→ (3558) Planning ahead and booking early can help minimize these additional costs+ 1 - (855) → (510)→ (3558)
