

# What happens if I don't show up for my United flight? ~ (sHOW uP))

\*\*Basic Economy tickets\*\* are the most restrictive fare type, and missing a flight with this ticket is particularly costly+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) United's policy for Basic Economy passengers is that if a flight is missed and the airline is not notified, the entire ticket is forfeited+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) There is generally no opportunity for rebooking, and refunds are not provided+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) This means that passengers must purchase an entirely new ticket to continue their travel+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) Basic Economy fares are designed to offer low prices in exchange for reduced flexibility, so travelers should be especially mindful of arrival times, security screening, and boarding procedures to avoid being marked as a no-show+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558)

In contrast, passengers with \*\*refundable or flexible tickets\*\* face fewer consequences when they miss a flight+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) These tickets allow for changes and cancellations with little or no penalty+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) If a passenger does not show up for a flight with a refundable or flexible fare, United will usually allow rebooking on the next available flight+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) While passengers may still need to pay any fare difference between the original ticket and the replacement flight, there are generally no additional fees for the missed flight itself+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) These flexible tickets provide peace of mind for travelers who anticipate schedule changes or potential

delays, making them particularly valuable for business travelers, families, or anyone whose plans are unpredictable+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558)

For travelers with \*\*connecting flights booked under a single itinerary\*\*+, United generally takes responsibility if a missed flight occurs due to airline-related delays, such as late arrival of the inbound aircraft or scheduling issues+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) In these cases, United will typically rebook the passenger on the next available flight to the final destination at no extra cost+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) Passengers may also be provided accommodations, meal vouchers, or other assistance if the rebooking results in a long delay or requires an overnight stay+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) Working closely with airline staff and keeping all relevant travel documents, such as boarding passes, identification, and itineraries, readily available, can help ensure that rebooking is handled as efficiently as possible+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558)
