

# What happens if you accidentally miss your flight? ~ (sHOW uP))

Airlines often allow some flexibility in cases of \*\*extraordinary circumstances\*\*+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) For instance, if a passenger misses a flight due to traffic delays, medical emergencies, natural disasters, or airline-initiated schedule changes, the airline may provide rebooking options without imposing the standard no-show penalties+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) Documentation, such as a medical certificate, accident report, or evidence of the external cause of delay, is usually required to qualify for these exceptions+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558) Airlines evaluate such situations individually and often take a more lenient approach if the passenger contacts them immediately and provides the necessary proof+ 1 - ( 855 ) → (510)→ (3558)
